Did you know?

That Slate Dock Road off of the Rhinecliff Road is actually Sleight Dock Road? It is named for the Sleight family who owned much land from Fishkill to Rhinebeck and Ulster County. They were slave owners, sloop captains, and merchants. There was a former slave who lived to over 100 years old in Rhinebeck. She was named Dinah and was probably given the surname Sleight as being owned by the family at one time. She is buried in historic Section E of the Rhinebeck Cemetery.

That Section E is on land donated by Mary Garrettson, daughter of Rev. Freeborne Garrettson.

What is the Open a Box of History Event? SOMETHING NEW!

The Museum is going to hold its first-ever Open a Box of History forum. It will be held Saturday, July 16, from 1:30-3 PM at the Museum.

What the program is, literally, is this: an archival box of material will be pre-laid out on a large table, and volunteers will talk about what is in the box. The box can contain well over 25 small objects, or well over 100 photographs. The objects can be as varied as a sewing thimble with Rhinebeck National Bank on it to a Harry Goldsmith milk bottle cap. Members of the audience will be invited to comment on the objects as they are discussed one by one. The event is FREE, sitting space is limited. We will do our best to accommodate everyone. This will be our first attempt at this type of an event. Spend the whole afternoon – view the exhibit half an hour before, or for an hour after. Light refreshments will be offered on the front lawn afterwards.
