2013 Progressive Dinner Sunday July 28, 2013



Our Annual Progressive dinner will be held on Sunday, July 28, 2013. The location of the dinner will be The Tannery, an historic property located at the corner of Route 308 and Pilgrim's Progress Road. Appetizers will be in the lovely main house with dinner in the beautifully restored barn.

The waters of the Landsman's Kill were the reason this site became as a woolen mill and later as a tannery. In 1795 George Ring selected it as his home site. The property was eventually purchased by Dr. George Miller, owner of the Schuyler House and incorporated into his estate "The Grove." Today The Tannery retains its integrity as a separate and tranquil site nestled in a bend in the ancient stream.



Dessert will follow at Sepascot Farm, located about 1.5 miles further east on Route 308 at the corner Cedar Heights Road. This 19th century farm with Hudson River bracketed Italianate style farmhouse is still operated as a working farm offering a wide variety of local products

Bowman Collection

Through the generosity of Donna Closs Anderson of Florida and her brother Jim Closs of Rhinebeck, we were given some important material from the estate of their aunt, Mrs. Margaret (Coon) Bowman. Mrs. Bowman, who died February 8, 2006, at 91, resided at Wabasso, FL. She was a Rhinebeck native born March 13, 1914, to the late Ethan A. Coon, the violet king, and Alice Traver, and a (1938) graduate of Rhinebeck High School and Elmira College.

She was a noted environmentalist in Florida and was the second woman to be elected Indian River (FL) County's Commissioner, serving from 1983-92. During WWII, she was a member of the Women's Army Corp (WACs). She later was a teacher of the deaf in Iowa and Ohio, a buyer for B. Altman in NYC, NY; and floral designer/shop manager at E. A. Coon & Co., Florist of Rhinebeck, NY. She served on the Florida State Board of the Audubon Society, and wrote a book entitled Where to Find Birds in Florida. She was involved with many other groups including the Friends of St. Sebastian River, the Pelican Island Preservation Society, and Marine Resources Council.

Mrs. Bowman was the sister of Mrs. Catharine Rhoades of Scottsdale, AZ and the late Mrs. Eleanor T. Closs of Rhinebeck, NY. Her late husband, John M. Bowman, was the longtime postmaster at Clinton Corners. The couple had no children of their own. She was buried in the Coon family plot at the Rhinebeck Cemetery.

The collection has some very important early photographs of students with their teachers at the Rhinebeck School. In some photographs one can see in the background what was then known as The Church of the Messiah (now Good Shepherd) on East Market & Mulberry Streets. Five photographs

have no year on them, but all the people are identified. There is also a larger Class of 1938 photograph which shows all the scholars graduating that year. There is also an undated 5 x 7" photograph, shown here, of seven girls and their teacher.

Two photographs have no year or names on them, but they are of students in front of the Rhinebeck School. That can be ascertained by the architecture and surroundings. There are photographs dated 1890, 1892 and 1894 with the students identified. Also in the collection was a notebook that had information on the DeGarmo Institute and some general information on the town's history. Pages had been ripped out of the book previously.
